RE: Lacey Act – 2008 Farm Bill Amendments

Enacted in 1900, the Lacey Act bans trafficking in unlawfully obtained wildlife, fish and plants. In 2008, the Act was amended to protect a broader range of plant products, including paper and timber. The Lacey Act now, among other things, makes it unlawful to import, export, transport, sell, receive, acquire or purchase through interstate or foreign commerce certain plants and plant products taken or traded in violation of domestic or international laws.

Roseburg is firmly committed to complying with the Lacey Act and legally trading in wood products. We will not knowingly purchase wood or wood fiber that originates from illegal logging sources. Roseburg exercises due diligence as a means to ensure compliance with all applicable wood standards and associated laws.

Roseburg certifies to the purchasers of its products that to the best of Roseburg's knowledge, and after exercising due diligence, the Fiber used therein was taken, possessed, transported, and sold in compliance with the Lacey Act.
